## **College Partnerships and Promotions**

The College has recently hosted a number of public events, giving interested students the opportunity to attend and expand their knowledge relating to current industry best practice. Last weekend, the AWI held a Shearing and Wool Handling workshop in the shearing complex and WorkSafe WA

## Hello everyone

It has been an amazingly busy start to Term 3! The Careers Day was fantastic and I took the opportunity to join Stephen Keatley, from West Coast Wools and Livestock, in taking a group of Year 12 students through their mock interviews. Stephen was particularly taken by the maturity of the students we interviewed.

Everyone spoke confidently and were engaging interviewees. As we all know, interviews are challenging and can be stressful, which is why we practise them at College. I have to admit that I was very proud of the students in our group, but even happier to know that Stephen was equally as impressed. Thanks go to Mrs Quartermaine for her hard work in organising the various activities for all of our students.

The Parent/Teacher Interviews afternoon went very well indeed, and it was great to see so many parents engaging with our teachers and trainers. A big thank you goes out to Mrs Kittow, who was the timekeeper for the afternoon. During this time, Mx Georgie and I took the opportunity to hold a Belonging and Connection workshop with Year 10, 11 and 12 students who were able to work on their teambuilding skills. WACoA Narrogin strongly values our students' opinions and their ideas on how we can improve and develop as a college. So during this workshop, students were asked for their feedback on such areas as the physical college environment, uniform and food. Some suggestions were very good and I brought these back to our Senior Staff meeting for further discussion. It is so important that our students genuinely feel connected to our college, so everyone's opinion counts.

At the end of the session, all students were able to nominate for various Leadership positions in 2025, and in the next few weeks, we will be starting the process to elect these people. Considering the calibre of the nominees, 2025 is already looking very bright.

This week (Week 4), all Year 11 students are taking part in a range of short courses. Students who are new to the College will be completing their White Card training and everyone will take part in the Defensive Driving course. This year, we have Fire and Safety Australia training students in PUAFER008 - Fire Extinguishing Training, and HLTAID011 - Provide First Aid. Both of these Units of Competency, when achieved, will contribute to the students' Certificate II in Agriculture.

Now is a good time for the Year 11 students to start thinking about their Work Placements which are taking place in Term 4. It is very important that everyone takes part in Work Place Learning in Years 11 and 12 as the completion of each block of 55 hours of WPL, with completed documentation, is equivalent to one Unit towards achieving their WACE (two blocks equals 2 Units and so forth up to a total of four). Over the course of the two weeks of placement, many students have easily clocked up 110 hours. Those Year 11 students who are intending to begin their Certificate III in Agriculture may choose to do their placement on the college farm, but places are limited, so please talk to Miss Tucci for more information.

Students developed their teambuilding skills, gave some feedback on their views regarding areas of improvement for the College and nominated themselves for a range of leadership positions in 2026.

Charlie, Sarah, Devin, Wyatt, Riley, Ryan, Eric and Riley won the tallest freestanding straw structure competition with this impressive tower. Congrats! Cliff (1990-1991), Matt (1992-1993) and Simon (1995-1996) Atkinson attended Narrogin Agricultural College (as it was known then) from humble beginnings and have gone on to have successful careers within and outside of agriculture, which they attribute to the College setting them up with the skills and attitude to succeed. The intent of the Atkinson Brothers' Annual Bursary is to encourage and support passionate young people to embark on a career by assisting in their education at WA College of Agriculture - Narrogin.

To contribute to the development of future WA College of Agriculture - Narrogin students, the Atkinson Brothers are offering each year a \$3,000.00 Bursary to a Year 11 student going into Year 12 to defray costs associated with boarding and / or course fees. The student will receive half of the scholarship at the start of Year 12 and the remainder at the start of Semester 2 in Year 12; provided they continue to meet the expectations and eligibility criteria. Bursary funds will be paid to the College. The recipients' school and boarding fees will be debited from these funds. Unspent scholarship funds will be returned to the funding body unless the recipient has been approved by the Bursary Selection Panel to expend surplus funds for a learning activity related to the objectives of the Bursary.

## Eligibility

- Currently enrolled in Year 11 at WA College of Agriculture Narrogin
- Not in receipt of Assistance for Isolated Children (AIC)

## **Selection Criteria**

- Demonstrated positive work ethic, enthusiasm and a high level of performance in all components of the course and willingness to keep learning.
- Demonstrated ability to overcome personal adversity.
- Demonstrated desire to succeed in life.

## Expectations of the bursary recipient

- Will maintain a positive and productive approach to their learning and involvement in the College.
- Will have an attendance record of 90% or better.
- Will maintain satisfactory effort across all subjects and learning areas according to school reports.
- Will do a presentation about their Agricultural College experience to the selection panel of the bursary at the end of Semester 1 and 2. The presentation may be written, video or in-person.

## **Application Process**

Students intending on applying for the Bursary must write a covering application letter addressing the selection criteria and supply the following documents:

- School Reports
- Resume
- Two references

Students will be short-listed by the Bursary Selection Panel and the short-listed students will be required to attend a face-to-face interview.


their studies. Their ability to balance theory and practical work will serve them well as they advance in their Trades education.

## Head of Teaching and Learning - Leanne Sjollema



Another busy few weeks have already passed this term, and the Year 12 classes have been humming with students working hard to complete their content. Year 12 English classes have been completing a range of learning activities, from developing resumes and creating cover letters, to analysing novels such as *The Maze Runner* and

## The Handmaid's Tale.

In Animal Production Systems, the Year 12 students have conducted research on staff and students' preference for lamb over mutton using College produced meat. In Plant Production Systems, students have been battling to keep the parrots out of their trial plots while planning their own cropping programs. PE students have been focused on learning about Biomechanics and Skill Acquisition while learning the finer points of Netball skills.

During Week 5, Year 11 and 12 ATAR students will be involved in the workshop, "Cultivating Profit", hosted by Renae Piggot. This workshop will run on Tuesday 13th August and focus on assisting students with developing financial literacy skills and understanding farm finance such as loans, equity, gross margins and variable cost ratios to support these students with the economics element of their studies and compliment the Agribusiness course. We would like to extend the opportunity to several year 11 and/or 12 General students who are interested in attending this program as well. If your child is interested in this workshop, they will need to complete an application form and submit it to me, Miss Sjollema.

The Year 11 students are exploring Integrated Pest Management in General Plant Production Systems, designing and conducting experiments in General Animal Production Systems and working on Injury Prevention techniques in PE Studies. At an ATAR level, the AgriScience students are learning about the science behind successful plant production systems. In English, students are embarking on a Novel study, reading *Hell Island* and learning how to analyse texts, while in Maths, students are evaluating current sales data to determine the feasibility of operating a cattle stud at the College.

The Year 10s are having a great time developing their Netball skills and have moved onto discussing Healthy Relationships in Health class, having been focused on completing their Keys For Life Programs last term. In Maths, students are studying Linear Equations and problem-solving skills, while in HASS, students are learning about economics and Finance. Students are exploring Dystopian texts such as *The Hunger Games* as their novel study for English this term.

I'd like to take the opportunity to remind parents and students that every Year 12 student is required to complete their End of Year Examinations during Week 10. These exams will be condensed into Week 9 and 10 of this term and these exams need to be completed as part of the course requirements along with any remaining assessments being conducted over the next seven weeks of term.

It was great to see so many parents at the Parent/Teacher Interviews last week. These interviews are the perfect opportunity to have a conversation with your child's teachers and about the progress your child has made and areas that can be further developed to ensure their studies are completed to the best of their ability. 
range of industries. The students said their favourite part was the hands-on displays.

## **Vocational Trainer - Renae Tucci**



As we start Term 3, we're wrapping up our busy breeding season. The calving and lambing have come to an end, and we now have 68 calves out in the paddock. This week, our Year 12 students successfully completed lamb marking for 444 merino lambs and the Year 11 students are set to handle the crossbreds next.

In the Cropping program, things have quietened down now that seeding is complete. With persistent wind and rain, Mr Hough hasn't had many opportunities to spray, we can't complain though, the rain has been great and the crops are up and looking promising.

In the Poultry area, we're expecting more chicks soon. Mr Bertuola has been busy sorting and selling some of his younger chickens, keeping the poultry operations running smoothly.

In Farm class, students are into theory and practical learning with our Technical Officers. They're gaining hands-on experience with small machinery usage and maintenance, skills that are essential for their future in agriculture. Last week, we started some Farm skills preparation, which went well, with Year 10 and 11 students learning some skills to take to the Royal Show. If any students are interested in attending this year, please see Mr Ryan Hough to get some training started!

A reminder for our students working towards their qualifications: Year 12 students need to complete 18 units of competency for their Certificate II in Ag, while Year 10 and 11 students need to complete 16 units. Year 12s only have 7 weeks to go, so keep working hard!



## ESPERANCE ORGANISED PRIMARY PRODUCERS CO-OPERATIVE LIMITED SCHOLARSHIP

EOPP was founded in 1971 by a group of farmers, led by Lyle Shipard, who had a vision to reduce the cost of farm merchandise.

The intent of the EOPP Scholarship is to encourage and support passionate young people to embark on an agricultural career by assisting in their education at any registered WA College of Agriculture.

Each scholarship will be awarded to one year 11 student who will receive half of the scholarship in year 11 and the remainder in year 12; provided they continue to meet the expectations and eligibility criteria.

The scholarship will be paid to the college to defray costs associated with boarding and / or course fees.

## Value

\$10,000 per recipient; split into 4 payments - \$2,500 per semester.

## **VET IN SCHOOLS SCHOLARSHIP**

The Public Education Foundation's VET in Schools Scholarship is a prestigious scholarship which aims to support students who are interested in pursuing vocational studies through their schools.

The scholarship has been made available from a bequest from Mr Raymond Romer. Mr Romer was the beneficiary of the generosity of others as a boy when his personal circumstances made it difficult for him to pursue his education. With additional support he was able to successfully complete his schooling, undertake further study and become a qualified member of an esteemed profession.

His wish was to assist students who, due to financial strain, may otherwise not be able to pursue their chosen career.

Up to six scholarships may be awarded, with each scholarship providing up to \$1,500 per year for **up to three years**. Students will be required to provide evidence of their ongoing enrolment in VET studies each year to remain eligible for their scholarship.

Students who complete their secondary education within the three year scholarship period will be eligible to continue to receive scholarship support provided they enrol fulltime in TAFE.

## Please note – students undertaking SBAT training are ineligible to apply for this scholarship.

The scholarship is to cover educational expenses such as:

- Uniforms and equipment
- Costs associated with work experience linked to VET subjects
- Stationery and books
- Laptop, iPad or similar device
- Subject or study related software
- Printer
- Internet connection for study at home
- School excursions and school camps
- Furniture for study such as desk, chair, lamp etc
- Face-To-Face Tutoring or Online Tutoring

If a student leaves public school before the end of the scholarship period or *does not continue their enrolment in VET studies* the scholarship will lapse. *Please note - if a student's attendance rate falls below an acceptable level at any time during the duration of the scholarship, the scholarship may be withdrawn*. Any unspent monies at the end of the scholarship period must be refunded to the Public Education Foundation scholarship fund.

- Have a positive attitude towards school and high rates of attendance
- Demonstrate they participate in school life
- Demonstrate they contribute in the community and/or in extracurricular activities

## **SELECTION PROCESS**

A selection panel will review all scholarship applications and assess them against the selection criteria. The selection panel will include representatives of the Public Education Foundation and independent experts. After considering all applications, the selection panel will recommend the selected applicants for the approval of the Public Education Foundation's Board. The successful applicant will be notified in December 2024.

Applicants will be notified of the outcome via email. If successful, the scholarship recipient's school principal will also receive notification directly.

All applications for the VET in Schools Scholarship must be submitted via the Foundation's online portal. ## **2025 INFORMATION SHEET**

## **NATIONAL REGIONAL & REMOTE TERTIARY SCHOLARSHIP**

The Public Education Foundation National Regional & Remote Tertiary scholarship is open to current Year 12 students who attend public high schools in *regional, rural or remote regions in all states and territories across Australia*. The scholarships seek to support motivated individuals with demonstrated merit, who are facing hardship, to realise their career goals.

To check if you are eligible to apply for this scholarship, please check the <u>MySchool website here</u> for your school. Only students whose **SCHOOL LOCATION** is designated as *Inner Regional, Outer Regional, Remote and Very Remote are eligible to apply*. If your school location is **NOT** designated as any of these, please apply for the National Tertiary scholarship instead.

The scholarships provide financial assistance to high potential students who intend to continue studying either at **TAFE** or **public** University **after completing Year 12 in 2024**. The funds assist with the transition into and progress through post-school education e.g. University bachelor degree, TAFE accredited apprenticeship or a TAFE Advanced Diploma.

Each scholarship offered consists of an annual payment of *up to* \$3,000 provided at the commencement of each academic year, *up to a maximum of 3 years*. For students required to relocate in order to take up study, an additional one-off payment *may* be provided to assist with initial relocation expenses. *The value of the scholarship offered to successful students will be based on their geographic location, personal circumstances and choice of post-school education.* 

The scholarship is intended to cover educational expenses such as:

- Course fees
- Necessary equipment
- Stationery and books
- Laptop
- Face-To-Face Tutoring or Online Tutoring

At the end of each academic year, the student will be required to submit to the Public Education Foundation evidence of their successful progression through their study in the form of an academic transcript. If a student is not progressing satisfactorily through their study, the Public Education Foundation reserves the right to terminate the scholarship.

If a student discontinues their University or TAFE education, the scholarship will lapse. Any unspent monies at the end of the scholarship period must be refunded to the Public Education Foundation scholarship fund.

## **BASIC ELIGIBILITY**

- Attends a Public School in a regional, rural or remote region of Australia (designated as inner regional, outer regional, remote or very remote according to the <u>MySchool website</u>)
- Currently in Year 12
- Australian citizen or permanent resident Note: Students who do not currently have either permanent residence or Australian Citizenship will be considered on a case by case basis
- Commitment to studying a TAFE course or University degree as a full-time student in 2025

## **SELECTION CRITERIA**

Successful applications should meet the following criteria:

- Evidence that current study, academic records or work experience is appropriate to the nominated tertiary study or training
- Determination to complete the nominated study or training
- Strongly articulated commitment to their chosen career path
- Experiencing equity hardship(s) that may prevent them from otherwise successfully transitioning to post-school study or training
- Positive attitude towards schooling and high attendance
- Participation in school life
- Contributes in the community and/or in extracurricular activities

## **SELECTION PROCESS**

A selection panel will review all scholarship applications and assess them against the selection criteria. The selection panel will include representatives of the Public Education Foundation, a representative from the funding partner and independent experts. After considering all applications, the selection panel will recommend the selected applicant for the approval of the Public Education Foundation's Board.

Applicants will be notified of the outcome in December 2024. If successful, the scholarship recipient's school principal will also receive notification directly.

## How To Apply

All applications for the National Regional & Remote Tertiary must be submitted via the Foundation's online portal. You will need to sign up for a <u>PEF-Apply</u> account to access the form. *Note – ALL sections of the application, INCLUDING the Principals Supporting Statement must be completed before the application can be submitted.* 

Prior to starting your application, you should compile the following information ready to submit:



- Applicant details including:
  - o full name
  - o gender
  - o date of birth
  - o phone number
  - o address
  - email (please ensure you nominate an email account you regularly access)
- Residence status (copy of residency Visa or Citizenship certificate is a requirement for applicants born outside of Australia)
- Parent/guardian details
- School and principal details
- School Point of Contact the person at the school who you would like correspondence sent to name, phone number and email
- Basic information about you/your family:
  - o whether you are Aboriginal, Torres Strait Islander, or Pacific or South Sea Islander
  - o your mob/family/traditional owner/language group
  - $\circ \quad \mbox{if you are from a Non-English-Speaking Background}$
  - o country of original of your parents and yourself
  - $\circ$   $\;$  which languages you speak and are spoken at home  $\;$
  - o how many adults live on your home
  - o how many of those adults are working
  - $\circ \quad$  who is the primary caregiver at home
  - o how many other school aged (or younger) children live in your house
  - o highest education qualification of your immediate family
  - o if you have a diagnosed disability or learning difficulty
  - $\circ \quad$  whether you have been in out-of-home care
  - o socio-economic background
  - $\circ \quad$  how you found out about the scholarship
- A statement outlining why you are a suitable candidate for this scholarship and how you meet each of the selection criteria. (maximum 400 words)
- A brief outline of how your current studies (including subject selection) and work experience support your planned University/TAFE studies.
- A brief outline of what your commitment is to your chosen career. (maximum 250 words)
- A brief explanation regarding the barriers you see for your future studies
- Your University/TAFE course preferences including name of institution, name of degree/course and course fees (you *must* submit at least one preference, but you can enter up to three).
- A copy of all pages of your most recent school report ready to upload
- A personal reference from someone who knows you. It could be a teacher, coach, family friend or an employer. (PDF or work format, maximum 400 words) *Please advise your referee that our Panels are not in a position to contact them for additional information. The reference should provide all information they feel is relevant.*



A supporting statement from your Principal which addresses the selection criteria (the applicant must initiate a request via the online application to the Principal. This will result in an email being sent to the Principal asking them to complete a statement of support online). This statement must be completed by your Principal before the application can be submitted.

Note for Principals: Please be aware that your statement is a critical component of the application form and your feedback is given considerable weight in the process of panel deliberations. The panels are looking for feedback that goes well beyond simple confirmation that the student is enrolled in your school, or that you endorse the application. Generic responses, or copy/paste responses from the applicants or referees statements WILL disadvantage the applicant.

## **SUBMITTING YOUR APPLICATION**

Once you have finalised your application and all elements are complete (including references and supporting statements as required) you can submit it for review.

Applications must be submitted by **11.59pm (AEST) Tuesday 13<sup>th</sup> August 2024.**
